

A TALE OF TWO FESTIVALS



Summer may be over, but thousands of people are still enjoying the park this fall. On Sept. 21, Lake James hosted the 16th Annual Catawba Riverfest. The weather was perfect, the food was fantastic, and over 1,500 people visited educational booths and learned all about what makes the Catawba River, its reservoirs and communities so special. Highlights of the event included the traditional kayak raffle and the release of a rehabilitated red-tailed hawk back into the wild. The immature raptor, nursed back to health by the May Wildlife Rehabilitation Center at Lees-McRae College, made quite an

exit as it flew out of its travel carrier and over the crowd before resting in a nearby tree.

On Oct. 12, seventeen teams from the Carolinas competed in the 3rd annual Lake James Dragon Boat Festival. Started by Lake James' own Healing Dragons, the event is co-sponsored by Carolina Healthcare System Blue Ridge. This year's event drew a crowd of more than 2,500 race participants and fans. Teams came from as far away as Charleston, SC and included club teams, cancer survivor teams and community teams. The community

teams did quite well, with several of them placing higher than club teams. The Dragons of Motown, a local team out of Morganton, placed first in their division while The James Gang, a community team sponsored by the Friends of Lake James State Park group and comprised of park staff and friends group members, placed second in their own division. Learn some basic star gazing tips and take home your own star chart. There will be telescopes and binoculars set up for viewing the night sky, but feel free to bring your own if you have them. Folding chairs are also recommended. We will meet in the East Picnic Shelter at the Paddy's Creek Area at 5 p.m. to start things off before migrating to the upper parking lot. AUTUMN HIKE – SATURDAY, NOV. 23

The Fox Den Loop Trail offers just the right mix of open water, shoreline woods and fields to see plenty of plants and animal species in a morning. Join Ranger Jamie Cameron for a leisurely trek to start the day. We'll begin at 9 a.m. from the Catawba River Area picnic shelter. Bring binoculars if you have them and dress appropriately for the forecast. The hike will take approximately 90 minutes.

PHOTO SAFARI – SUNDAY, NOV. 24



As an added bonus, winter offers some of the most majestic views of the Linville Gorge and the Black Mountain Range of the year. Ranger Clay Veasey will be your captain and guide aboard the park patrol boat as we search for loons, otters, eagles and scenic vistas. The weather could be blustery, so be sure to dress warmly if you are one of the eight lucky participants. Registration is required and available on a first-come, first-served basis. It's safe to describe Lake James State Park is a highly desirable landing spot for rangers and maintenance staff across the 41 parks and recreation areas in North Carolina. The proof is in the low employee turnover here: When you get to Lake James you stay at Lake James.

It is therefore rare and exciting to welcome a new member to the ranger ranks at the park. Wade Engels arrived for his first day on duty near the end of September and has quickly established himself as the park's lead interpretation and education ranger, as well as volunteer coordinator.

It's easy to put him in these important positions given Wade's already impressive experience as a North Carolina state ranger. In 2011 Engels started his career as a ranger at Haw River State Park. He then served at Crowder's Mountain State Park from 2014 to 2017. After returning to his native northern New Jersey in the interim, the team at Lake James happily welcomed Wade back to the state park family this year as its newest member.

"Wade Engels comes to us with so much park experience and accolades from former co-workers that it feels like winning the park ranger lottery," said Park Superintendent Nora Coffey. "He brings a wide range of skills and expertise that will have immediate

value in terms of park operations and visitor experience."

"My family and I are very happy to be here," Engels said. "Lake James is located in such perfect geography

for access to outdoor activities on the water and in the mountains."

In terms of how he views his duties and responsibilities Engels remarked, "The position of lead **I&E** ranger is especially worthwhile

because it focuses on the importance of giving young people a positive mindset towards the outdoors. As volunteer coordinator. my goal will be to put people on tasks and assignments that give them the most satisfaction, while maximizing their skills to help the park be the best it can be."

The park staff has also seen some recent in-house reshuffling as Jamie Cameron has been promoted into a Ranger II position that brings new responsibilities and challenges to his job. Ranger Cameron has worked at Lake James for more than eight years and is well-deserving of this move up the ranks according to Coffey. "Since he was hired here back in 2011, Ranger Cameron

has shown his dedication and put in hard work that make him an excellent Ranger II candidate. I expect he will prove himself quite capable in this new capacity."

NATURE NOTES



While the calendar might suggest the year is coming to an end, the plants and animals we share Lake James and the surrounding landscape with have no concept of such things. The arrival of winter is neither a beginning or an end; it's just another season with different challenges for survival.

While winter marks a dramatic decrease in the number of human visitors at the park, birds and animals are increasingly easy to spot and observe. Much of that is due to the lack of

foliage. The winter gallery of bare trunks and branches are a stark contrast to the calliope of motion and colors during spring, summer and fall. Without leaves to hide behind, wildlife is seemingly more abundant to the human eye.

During this period of feast or famine, songbirds of many species will flock together into roving groups that can be as large as several dozen individuals. These birds might not be of a feather, but they benefit from the partnership by helping each other find food and avoid predators. Birdwatchers can take advantage of the behavior during their hikes by locating the flocks and patiently scanning through them for hidden gems. The most abundant and visible members of these feeding groups are tufted titmice and Carolina chickadees, but there are often golden-crowned and ruby-crowned kinglets, pine warblers, Eastern towhees, Northern cardinals and hermit thrushes in tow. If you're really lucky, you'll spot some of the rare winter birds as well; brown creepers, red-breasted nuthatches, fox sparrows and winter wrens to name a few.

YEAR OF THE SNAKE: THE FINALE

And so we come to the final installment of North Carolina State Parks' Year of the Snake.

Over the course of the past 10 months, we've learned a lot about these interesting and often misunderstood members of the environment we live in.

Snakes are found in just about every habitat there is in the state of North Carolina, from the darkest forests to the busiest cities. There are types of snakes adapted to aquatic environments and types that require rocky outcrops in which to hibernate during winter.

Some species of snake prey on insects and other small invertebrates while others eat mammals as large as cottontail rabbits.

Most snakes in the American Southeast are non-venomous and rather rely on constriction to subdue prey. The few venomous species inject a toxic cocktail into their victims and then hang back until incapacitation or death has occurred.

Snakes in North Carolina run the gamut – from the tiny, 6-inch worm snake to the common black rat snake that can reach 6 feet in length.

Most importantly, we have come to understand snakes are a vital thread in the fabric of our natural world. They help maintain rodent populations at healthy levels and even serve as an important food source themselves for birds of prey and mammalian carnivores.

Last but not least, snakes are just plain cool to look at. We hope you've enjoyed the Year of the Snake. Stay tuned to find out what 2020's focus will be.
